Message From The President

As quilters and fiber artists, we are always looking for things that inspire us and challenge us to broaden our interests and to improve to our skills. I was so impressed and inspired by Laura Coe's quilt that she showed at our July meeting.

She used fabric given to her by an acquaintance and cut it up in small squares, maybe 1 1/2 to 2 inches. She sewed the squares together in long strips and used them in this quilt. It was beautiful. At one of our retreats in Sebring, Rose Valentine cut fabric strips about 1 1/2 inches wide and 20 inches long. She sewed about eleven strips together to make a long strip. Using a strip tube ruler, (mine is made by cozy quilt designs) she cut many triangles from her strips. She then used a strip of a solid color and cut triangles. After sewing the triangles together, the

result was a beautiful quilt, basically using her scraps of fabric.

My story seems to be going nowhere, but bear with me. My daughter, Kathryn Tarquinio, is always looking at videos that help with cleaning and decluttering her home. She has a favorite called how to declutter if you are over fifty-five, (I don't know why the age matters). The focus of the video was to take ten minutes and work on any project, sorting pictures, cleaning out your closet or a drawer, etc. At the end of ten minutes you should have three piles of stuff, one to keep, one to donate, and one to throw away. Then walk away and find something else to do. Don't try to spend three hours cleaning out your; frustration sets in and nothing is finished. I thought that was great advice.

So, as a result of feeling inspired and challenged by these women, I have come up with a plan that make use of my

many bins of scraps. I am an early riser, sometimes getting up at 4:00 am. Instead of drinking coffee and watching some uninteresting thing on television, I am going to become more productive with my scraps and design some quilts. I plan to have my scraps where I can get to them easily in the early morning hours. I will get my coffee and start pressing my scraps.

Eventually I will have enough to start cutting and sewing squares, strips and triangles. This is a project that has no time limit but one that makes good use of my scraps and my time. I will spend more than ten minutes at a time on this but probably not more than an hour each morning. Since I have gone public with this effort, I will give you an update each month. I only hope I don't get sidetracked! ~ Kay

2025 August Block of the Month

Each month's block will be shown at the previous monthly meeting, posted online and be in the newsletter.

Each block will be made with patterned fabrics in black, white and a feature color. Next month's feature color will be the color from the previous month's fat quarter swap.

So August's BOM will be made with ORANGE (July's fat 1/4 color) as the featured color.

Please see the attached sample of July's BOM and the block sewing directions.



QUIP BOM # 7- Wagon Wheel

Turn in this block at August Meeting. Use the accent color of Orange for the middle 4 patch and Black for the blocks around the outside.

To make this block, you will need:

- (8) background 3" squares, (2) 2-1/2" squares, and (4) 2-1/2" x 4-1/2" rectangles
 (4) black 3-3/8" squares, and (4) 2-1/2" x 4-1/2" rectangles,
 - (2) orange 2-1/2" squares
- To make the square-in-a-square corners, cut the (8) background 3" squares on the diagonal to make (16) triangles. Sew a triangle to opposite sides of the (4) black 3-3/8" squares.



- Press and square up to 4-1/2".
- Sew a black 2-1/2" x 4-1/2" rectangle to a background 2-1/2" x 4-1/2" rectangle the long way.

 Make (4) sets and press to the dark.
- Sew these between (2) square-in-a-square blocks to make the top and bottom row of the block. Press. Sew the remaining (2) to both sides of the four-patch block. Press.
 - Sew the three rows together, taking care not to overlap the seams at the intersection. Give your block one final press and square it up to 12-1/2".


Wheelchair Quilt Pattern for Charity Donations


WHEELCHAIR QUILT


The wheelchair quilts that we make at Sunshine Linus are very simple and easy to make.

The quilts measure $36" \times 36"$ with the bottom corners cut out to make way for the wheels of the wheelchair.




- ≈ Cut 16 x 9 ½" fabric squares
- ≈ Sew into four rows of four.
- Using a quilting ruler and rotary cutter, cut the two outside bottom squares diagonally.
- ≈ Quilt & Bind as desired.





An alternative pattern would be:

- ≈ Cut 144 x 3 ½" squares sewn into 12 rows of 12 squares.
- Cut diagonally through the bottom three squares on the two outside bottom squares.
- ≈ Quilt & Bind as desired.

Sewing with Nina

Sadly, I didn't have the privilege of knowing Nina as long or as well as the rest of you, however in this last 8 months she made a huge impression on me and the time that I did know her will color the rest of my quilting journey.

When I first came to QUIP, Nina immediately went out of her way to introduce herself and to make me feel welcome. But she didn't stop at just saying hello. She took the time to really get to know me; she asked me about myself, my personal history, why I quilt, and how much I knew about quilting. When she realized that there were things that I wanted to learn and gaps in my knowledge, she promptly offered to help, making sure to get my information and actually contacted me later that day.

Nina offered to teach me a bunch of different techniques and to work on a sample quilt with me. On our first session, she had me pick out an array of fabrics and colors that appealed to me, so she could get a feel for what I liked and of my personal style. That's the moment that I knew that Nina and I were going to be friends. She didn't just want to teach me techniques, she wanted to help me to find my own quilting voice, not just imitate hers.

Not only did Nina encourage, support and inspire me; she challenged me as well. When she found out that I make costumes, she shrewdly asked specific questions about different techniques that I use to find out where my sewing comfort levels were. Then she laughed while looking at the sampler pattern and told me how we were going to change up several blocks and use different techniques that would make them more challenging for me. Basically, she took away everything that I was already comfortable with and switched them to techniques that I did not already know. Initially, I felt deflated to lose the blocks that I was comfortable with, but I also recognized the wisdom in her decision, and



her obvious amusement at my distressed facial expression had me laughing along with her.

I was always nervous when showing Nina my work, especially when I knew that it wasn't perfect. Nina would take the block that I had painstakingly made, and deftly rip out my stitches while matter-of-factly telling me where I went wrong. She was never offensive or judgmental with her corrections, she was always supportive and made me feel okay about my wonky block.

Nina fostered and encouraged my creativity; she knew that was just as important as technique. She constantly challenged me to stretch myself, grow my skills and to be unafraid of new techniques. She was a wonderful cheerleader, mentor, inspiration and above all, a caring friend. I will miss her greatly.

I know that Nina's memory will live on in all of us. She was an inspiration in so many ways and to so many people. She was a quilter, an artist, a teacher and a friend. Giving of herself and sharing her knowledge was a way of life for Nina. I hope that we will all carry her spirit with us and actively support, inspire and mentor each other and others in her stead.

Quilting Tip of the Month!

This tip was shared with us by Denise Glaser, and comes from Bold Notion Quilting on Facebook. It's the little things... I had a backing come in that was about 2 in short of the width of the quilt but was 20 in longer than the length of the quilt (quilt backing was 53x 84, top is 56x66) and so I did the diagonal piecing method where I squared up my backing/folded it on the diagonal lengthwise cut along the diagonal lengthwise and then I repositioned the triangles to give me a fatter square and now I'm going to have a 60x76 square for a quilt top that is 56x66 so now I can actually put it on my long arm some areas will be a little bit tight but I'll be able to work with the backing that the client gave me and because the backing is non-directional this works so easily!
